




CONSTRUCTION TO BEGIN SUMMER OF 2007

King County protects public health and the environment by conveying and treating the region's wastewater. Many of King County's wastewater facilities are more than 40 years old and need to be improved. Constructing new facilities is also necessary to ensure safety and system reliability. The purpose of the new King Street Odor Control Facility is to minimize odors from and corrosion in a section of King County's Elliott Bay Interceptor (EBI). The new odor control facility will be constructed directly north of Seahawks Stadium (Qwest Field) and directly south of King Street on the Stadium's North Parking Lot on King County property. The above ground facility will consist of an air duct and odor control equipment such as a mist and grease eliminator, a fan to draw the air from the EBI and push it through the odor control facility, a carbon bed scrubber to remove odorous substances from the air, a silencer and a stack for discharging treated air to the atmosphere. There will also be associated electrical equipment in a small above ground enclosure. These improvements

will minimize odor releases in the vicinity of the King Street Station, Seahawks Stadium and Pioneer Square. For many years, residents, people working in the area and sports fans have complained about the sewer odor in the neighborhood. King County has been working with the following organizations during the design process: the City of Seattle, Pioneer Square Preservation Board, Washington State Department of Transportation, Washington State Public Stadium Authority, and Amtrak.





KING STREET Odor Control Project • February 2007



Impacts for residents and pedestrians during construction will be increased truck traffic in the neighborhood, occasional traffic disruptions, additional noise during working hours (7 am to 5 pm, Monday through Friday) and an increase of dust and dirt in the air. King County will keep you informed during construction by distributing fliers and e-mail alerts and will maintain a 24-hour construction information phone line to respond promptly to questions and deal with any problems that may arise.

CONSTRUCTION IMPACTS

King County will construct a temporary pedestrian bypass corridor around the construction zone which will be protected with concrete barriers. During construction, pedestrians will be

slightly rerouted by the concrete structures path. Access to the Weller Street Bridge, the King Street Station and the parking lot of Seahawks Stadium (Qwest Field) will remain open.
